Vote on crime could harm relations

Swiss voters have approved a plan for automatic deportation of foreigners who commit serious crimes or benefit fraud, in what was a significant victory for the nationalist party that pushed the proposal against the will of the government.

Some 52.9% of voters backed the proposal from the nationalist Swiss People's party (SVP). It was opposed by 47.1% of voters. A government-backed counter proposal failed – it would have required a case-by-case review by a judge before an individual was deported.

"I'm totally for it," said Emma Link, 86, after voting in Geneva. She blamed foreigners for what she said was rising crime, adding that she had recently been robbed on her way home from a nearby shop.

The SVP plan drew fire before today's referendum from legal experts who said it could breach offenders' human rights. Marcelo Kohen, a professor of international law at the Graduate Institute in Geneva, said people who had lived all their life in Switzerland, married Swiss citizens and had children but never obtained Swiss passports, would be unusually hard hit by expulsion.

Under Switzerland's political system, any group wanting to change the law can collect 100,000 signatures to force a referendum. Last year the country drew international condemnation after voters defied a government recommendation by approving a law to ban the construction of minarets.

The government will now have to draft a law requiring automatic expulsion of foreigners found guilty of crimes such as murder, rape, drug dealing or benefit fraud. Kohen predicted such a law would be challenged before the European court of human rights.

Likewise, the European Union – with which Switzerland has signed a bilateral treaty guaranteeing freedom of movement – would probably object to its citizens being automatically deported without the chance of judicial review, he said.


During the run-up to the vote, anti-racism groups bemoaned that the SVP's posters showed white sheep kicking black sheep off a Swiss flag, saying it played on stereotypical images of foreigners as criminals.

Virginie Studemann voted against the plan. "I think it's sad for our country," she said outside a polling station in the centre of Geneva. "It's part of a concerted attack against foreigners."

Voters also rejected a proposal to revise the country's tax system today. The Swiss news agency SDA reported that 58% of voters opposed the plan, while 42% backed a proposal by the Social Democrat party to introduce a minimum tax in all Switzerland's 26 cantons, or states.

The Polling group gfs.bern said earlier this month that initial enthusiasm for the plan evaporated after heavy campaigning by business groups, who warned it could harm the Swiss economy. Several prominent billionaires also spoke out against the proposal and threatened to move abroad if it were accepted.

Derek Meakin: A very hard act to follow

It is with sadness that we report the passing of Derek Meakin on Saturday 9 October.

Derek was born in Macclesfield in 1926 and apart from a spell in London working as London correspondent for the Manchester Evening News, never moved far from the town. He was an entrepreneur long before the word became fashionable. As a young boy, he bred rabbits with the advertising slogan "Rabbits for pot or pet" - never one to miss an opportunity. His next enterprise was to start a Sunday cinema club, showing feature films on a 16mm projector. When this came to the attention of the 'official' cinema a visit was made to his parents and Derek was persuaded to close the club.

Leaving school at 14, Derek became a young reporter on the Macclesfield Courier, but sent (and sold) articles to papers all over the UK and abroad. In 1942 he moved on to be editor of the Buxton Herald before being called up.

He served as a Coder in the Royal Navy during the latter part of the war then continued for his National Service, but he was

already publishing news, even though it was on a blackboard for the crew!

Back in civilian life, Derek joined the Manchester Evening News who later transferred him to London as their London correspondent. But it was a new era and a different medium was beginning to come alive. In 1957 Derek left London to take up the exciting post of Northern Features

Editor of the TV Times at the forefront of British commercial television.

He interviewed many famous names, from Alfred Hitchcock and Noel Coward to Bob Monkhouse and Cliff Richard. Not content with that, he saw another opportunity and in the mid-1960s he set up Post Publications and pioneered the concept of the local give-away newspaper funded by advertising. Selling the group of nearly 20 local papers, he moved into magazines and established Europress. Anticipating the home computer boom, he started several monthly computer magazines, and this led to making and selling their own programmes with Database Software and the award-winning Fun School series of educational software.

There is much more. He embraced Europe, attended an Esperanto conference and travelled to France and Poland just after the war, learning French – which led him to meet and marry his Swiss wife, Lucie, in Macclesfield with a reception at Macclesfield Town Hall (where they returned in 2000 for their Golden Wedding anniversary

celebration). Derek worked tirelessly to advance and improve Anglo-Swiss relations and held dual nationality, having been granted Swiss citizenship.

Derek never really retired.
Latterly his work was not so prolific because of illness, but he continued to write, edit and design the UK pages of the Swiss Review. Oh yes, he did the web page too! A long time active Rotarian and member of the Swiss Club Manchester, he was always interested in anything new, the news and the future, but always had time to help others, whether with composing copy for the press or helping a grandchild with their cv.

Never content to stand still, he was always looking for new opportunities and was always an early adopter of new technology, he pre-ordered both iPhone and iPad as soon as they were announced and amazed both his own age group and his grandchildren with his IT knowhow.

Derek leaves his wife Lucie, four children and 10 grandchildren. He will be greatly missed.
